From the Pastor's Desk:

It has become fashionable in recent times for people to compose so called *bucket lists*. A *bucket list* is a catalog of things someone wants to accomplish before they *kick the bucket*. These lists often include visiting dream travel locations, risky or even death-defying feats like skydiving, or simply adventures that require a greater exercise of courage or imagination. A survey of published bucket lists reveals, however, that they are decidedly self-indulgent and self-satisfying. Rarely does such a list include helping lepers, feeding the hungry or assisting at a far-off mission.

The Season of Advent is urgent and immediate: the Lord is coming NOW. A bucket list won't do in preparation for this event. Our Lord and St. Paul both warn us to stay awake so that we will be ready to meet the Lord when He comes. Saint Paul tells the Romans what activities would preoccupy us and keep us from being prepared when the Lord comes. Simply put, when Jesus comes back would you want Him to catch you drunk? or caught in jealousy? in sexual promiscuity? Saint Paul invites us to live a transparent life in the light of day. Darkness – especially a darkened soul – provides a hiding place for sin. When Jesus comes He will turn on the light switch. If we're living as we should, then we have nothing to be ashamed of.

So if you knew Jesus was coming for you today, what would you do? This might be a sobering and uncomfortable thought, but it's realistic. What would we use the last moments of our earthly life for if we knew they were the last moments? Now, before you answer that question...remember that Jesus promises eternal life to those who follow Him. When Jesus comes, whether at the moment of our death or at the end of time, it's only the beginning. The problem with the bucket list is that for many people it betrays a belief that we cease to exist the moment we die. If we live life well, generously, honestly, and in friendship with Jesus, then we have nothing to worry about. Our life has meaning because of the kind of person we become, not through a list of accomplishments in an obituary.

The Rector of the Seminary used to tell the seminarians that if they studied diligently and steadily each day then the night before an exam they should go to the movies or something. If we're doing what we're supposed to do every day then there's no reason to cram for a final examination the night before. The "*all-nighter*" approach is foolish. At that point learning doesn't matter, only passing the test. With Jesus we can't just squeak by or squeak into the Kingdom of Heaven.

Today is the day to prepare, not make a list of preparations. Today isn't some monumental day listed on the calendar. Today is the continuation of the life we're living and the material for the life ahead. Our goal is not to have some supernatural encounter or experience of God on a particular day, but to make every day an experience of Jesus' love and friendship. The word *Advent* means *Beginning*; don't wait, *begin* today!

ADORATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT


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"As often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes" (1 Corinthians 11:26).

We have been having a fantastic year so far in ELA and Literature!

All classes have been working very hard on their grammar units. So far we have covered nouns, pronouns, and some adjectives! We have been working on our writing skills. 8th grade has been completing a research paper on an important figure from the 1940s to the 1960s. 7th grade has been learning how to write a newspaper article as a part of their *Stargirl* unit.
